Strong Communities Start Here... Keep Our Doors Open!

The Ballarat East Neighbourhood House at Barkly Square, and almost half of Victoria's Neighbourhood Houses/Centres, need your help to keep our doors open. Lend your voice, fill out a campaign postcard in hard-copy or online via the QR code.

Each week, more than 185,000 Victorians access community support and local services through the 400+ neighbourhood houses in the state, including four in Ballarat.

94% of neighbourhood house visitors experience improved physical wellbeing and 96% report improved emotional wellbeing as a result of participating.

Neighbourhood Houses are the heart of our community — offering vital services, education and a welcoming place for everyone. Without urgent action, communities risk losing the safe, inclusive spaces thousands of Victorians rely on every week.

The Ballarat East Neighbourhood House hosts a weekly Winter Woollies group (several members pictured above) on Wednesday afternoons. Participants have a wonderful time chatting, laughing and sharing stories, whilst knitting and crocheting, creating items to donate to people in need in the Ballarat community.

Coordinator of the Winter Woollies Group volunteer Sandra says, "Without the support of the Ballarat East Neighbourhood House, we wouldn't have a space to get together all year round." Participant Susan says, "I love the weekly get together and the friendships I have made" and Heather says the Neighbourhood House "gives us a place to come together in a safe and friendly environment".

Volunteers from the local community are kev to the Neighbourhood House model. We provide the space, marketing, administration, coordination and insurance for volunteers to host groups which bring people together. Christine volunteers to lead our Book Group, Liz, our Mendalong group and Susan and Gerry host Climate Cafe group. Supported by our Federation University placement student, volunteers (and sisters) Jenny and Helen lead a Walking Group and Chatty Group. Three participants from our Community Auslan Courses, Lynden, Al and Sue, volunteer to help coordinate our two Auslan Practice Groups. They give their time, skills and enthusiasm to help bring our community together.

organisation is small community-managed charity, based at Barkly Square, Ballarat East, alongside around 30 other amazing local organisations. We work within community development framework, looking to create community connections, advance health outcomes mental prevent social isolation of people living and working in the broader Ballarat East area and beyond.

We offer a range of regular, free or low-cost activities and groups, various volunteering roles, adult education opportunities and more.

Our peak body, Neighbourhood Houses Victoria, is calling on the State Government to increase annual funding by \$11.7M or risk the closure of 200 neighbourhood houses across Victoria, including the Ballarat East Neighbourhood House.

Many neighbourhood houses and community centres are grappling with increased community needs due to cost of living pressures, while having to deal with cost increases themselves. It's simple: without sustainable funding our doors will close. With fair funding we will continue to be the safe, welcoming places every Victorian community needs. It's time to save our sector and keep our doors open.

The 171st Anniversary of the Eureka Stockade



Eureka Centre will mark the 171st anniversary of the Eureka Stockade with a range of special events. This program provides an opportunity for people to honour those involved in defending their democratic rights and liberties at the Eureka Stockade, which is widely considered the birthplace of Australian democracy. People of all ages and backgrounds are encouraged to join together to reflect on Eureka's legacy and celebrate its place at the heart of Ballarat's community identity.

The program commences with Eureka Sunday in the Park on Sunday 30 November 2025 from 10.00 am to 2.00 pm. This inclusive program of family-friendly activities features free face painting, craft activities, lawn games, interactive music with Coco Sounds and a special Eureka-themed Storytime. This community celebration is presented in partnership with the Art Gallery of Ballarat and the Ballarat Aquatic and Leisure Centre. The nearby Eureka Pool will present

the Eureka Sunday Pool Party, offering free entry all day from 8.00 am to 6.00 pm.

At 11.00 am on Eureka Sunday cultural historian Peter Freund will present the talk 'Commemorations and Crisis: Evocations of the Eureka Stockade 1930-1960', followed at 1.00 pm by a rehearsed reading by Overlook Projections of 'The Silver Stars of Freedom' - a 1935 play by Florence Spriggins, inspired by the Eureka Stockade. Tickets to the play reading are \$10/\$8 and available via Eventbrite. Hermione Verbeek will also lead two guided walking tours on the day, leaving from the site of the Old Government Camp at 8.45 am and 11.00 am and arriving at the Eureka Centre. Find out about Ballarat as it was during the time of Eureka and the remnants left behind. This 90-minute tour requires participants to walk a significant distance. complimentary shuttle service is available to return participants to town. Tickets are free, but bookings via Eventbrite are essential to avoid disappointment.

Eureka Day on Wednesday 3 December marks the day in 1854 in which protesting miners barricaded in the Eureka Stockade were attacked by military and police forces in an unexpected dawn raid. Two special events will be held on Eureka Day, beginning with the Eureka Stockade Commemorative Service at 8.00 am. Here we will honour those who fought and died on both sides of the battle and remember those who helped forge Australia's democratic traditions through debate, lobbying, protest, and direct action. The service will take place at the historic Eureka Stockade Monument, followed by a free breakfast at the Eureka Centre.



At 6.00 pm one of our leading political and economic thinkers, George Megalogenis, will present the Peter Tobin Oration on the topic, 'Eureka, the rise, fall and return of Ballarat as a population magnet'. Following his talk, George will be joined in conversation by journalist, author and the Guardian Australia's former rural and regional editor, Gabrielle Chan. Tickets (\$15/\$12) are selling fast. Book now via Eventbrite or join the waitlist to secure your spot. The annual Peter Tobin Oration honours the contribution of the late Peter Tobin OAM to the commemoration of the Eureka Stockade. Behind the News

On Thursday 30 October students at Woodmans Hill Secondary College had the incredible opportunity to have ABC's Behind the News (BTN) come and share what it is like to be a journalist. We learned what a day looks like for youth journalists, saw behind the scenes and were shown the steps for creating website and TV content. We investigated what it looked like filming the news, how topics are chosen and how students are interviewed.

They touched on topics including Artificial Intelligence (AI) and, in particular, how they have harnessed AI in the field of journalism. We were shown a video of students guessing if content was AI or a reality. What this showed is that it was very difficult to determine what was created with AI and what was real. What stood out was the increasing complexity of the AI used to make realistic videos. Some of them got us second guessing everything we see on social media.

Later, we did an interview about our thoughts on the under 16 social media ban, which is coming soon. We were asked questions about the effects of the ban on youth. Overall, it was a great experience and one that we hope the school gets the opportunity to participate in again!

Victoria's Oldest Country Kindergarten

Over 114 years ago what began as a playgroup organised by a group of women, led to the opening of the *Ballarat Free Kindergarten*. Now after more than a century of expanding small minds, from a belief that children deserved the very best start in life, it remains a special place in the hearts of many locals.

With the commencement of early childhood education, as country Victoria's oldest kindergarten, established 1911 and later changing its name in 1995 to *Bakery Hill Kindergarten*, its story is a contributing part of history for the educational movement in the state of Victoria. It has weathered many challenges over the century, always overcome with support from local families, private benefactors, dedicated staff, historical mothers' club fundraising and the parents who make up the association.


In the past, committees have had to take on financial and managerial operations new to them and rely heavily on parent participation for fundraising. While the management of the kindergarten is no longer their responsibility (although still locally run), the building is still owned by the Bakery Hill Kindergarten Association and is supported by its committee and parent association.
