Sunnyside Woollen Mill, Mount Pleasant

Due to the decline in mining and the scarcity of employment, the idea of a woollen mill at Ballarat was first mooted by Andrew Anderson in 1868.

James Main, who was the prime mover of the project, convened a meeting in July 1870 for the purpose of establishing a woollen mill at Ballarat. Various sites were looked at to build the mill and Sunny Corner Mount Pleasant near to the Yarrowee River was chosen. For most of its life the mill was known as the "Sunnyside Woollen Mill".

The foundation stone was laid for the first building with grand honours in 1872. The architect for this building was Caselli, a wellknown architect for numerous other buildings in Ballarat.

In July 1873 a road was constructed from Humffray Street to the mill gates, this being Hill Street. Gas was also connected to the mill.

The first flannel produced by the mill was exhibited in August 1873.

The second building was erected in 1874 and a further extension was added in 1882. The building you see today fronting Hill Street, was erected in 1886. It is unknown if Caselli was the architect for this addition as he died about 18 months prior to it being built.

In 1889 the old company was liquidated and a new company was formed known as the "Ballarat Woollen and Worsted Company".

During WWI the mill had a contract to supply material for army uniforms. In 1918 the new warehouse was built, this being the building closest to the Yarrowee River.

The round chimney you see today was erected in 1930, the first chimney being of a square design, and was located at what would now be approximately the centre of the building.

In its hey-day the company employed about 500 people; due to import tariffs being lifted it could not compete and closed in 1981.

Friends of Canadian Corridor



Friends of Canadian Corridor volunteers planted 6500 trees, shrubs and grasses along Canadian Creek.

Friends of Canadian Corridor (FoCC) volunteers have planted 6500 trees, shrubs and grasses as part of the Victorian Government's Green Links "Urban Ripple" project on four sites along the Canadian Creek, Lal Lal Drain and Sailors Gully. The "Urban Ripple" revegetation project was funded by a grant of \$701,000 to revegetate waterways in Ballarat. The FoCC has four of the project's thirteen sites.

Residents around the sites were letterboxed with an invitation to join the community plantings. Signs were placed on sites advertising the coming planting events. Local residents responded in numbers to the community planting days. In addition, four local schools assisted with plantings at Soapy's Dam and beside Sailors Gully in Woowookarung Regional Park.

Community Plantings

The FoCC held six Sunday community plantings during July and August:

- 800 trees, shrubs and grasses along the Canadian Creek Reserve north of Hocking Avenue on 13 July 2025.
- 600 riparian shrubs and grasses planted along Sailors Gully in Woowookarung Regional Park on 27 July 2025.
- 500 riparian shrubs and grasses planted along Lal Lal Drain on 3 August 2025.
- 750 trees, shrubs and grasses planted along the Canadian Creek on 10 August 2025 just north of the 13 July plantings.
- Sailors Gully received 300 plants on 17 August 2025.
- 450 trees, shrubs and grasses planted at Soapy's Dam on Sunday 31 August 2025.

Student Plantings

295 students planted 2065 trees, shrubs and grasses in thirteen sessions.

The FOCC hosted 295 students from Damascus College, Mount Clear College, Mount Rowan College and Woodmans Hill College in 13 planting sessions over July and August.

Students planted 1565 trees, shrubs and grasses on Soapy's Dam, Canadian and 500 on the east side of the Bunny Trail in Woowookarung Regional Park.

Saver Plus - Financial Education Adoptees' Support



Saver Plus is a financial education program designed to assist people on lower incomes to build their financial skills and develop a savings habit. Participants join five online financial education workshops called *MoneyMinded*. They're encouraged to save consistently for 10 months and at the end of the program, their savings are matched up to \$500 by ANZ.

Saver Plus was developed by The Brotherhood of St Laurence and ANZ in 2003 and is funded by ANZ and the Australian Department of Social Services. The program is delivered across Australia in partnership with The Smith Family and Berry Street. More than 65,000 people have completed the program since 2003 and have saved over \$32 million. ANZ has matched over \$27.5 million.

An independent 2024 University of Tasmania report Saver Plus at 21, Building resilience that lasts, found that participants improved both their financial skills and their personal confidence.

After Saver Plus:

- Participants' financial wellbeing improved from 35 out of 100 to 66 out of 100 (against a national average of 54 out of 100).
- Financial resilience scores leapt from 27 out of 100 to 59 out of 100.
- 92% felt more confident generally after achieving their savings goal.
- 71% felt more satisfied with their life overall.
- 69% felt less stressed about the future generally.

Who can join Saver Plus?

To be eligible to join Saver Plus, you need to meet all of these requirements:

- Be 18 years or older
- Have a current Health Care or Pensioner Concession Card
- Have a child in school, starting school next year, or be studying yourself
- Get a regular income (can be you or your partner)
- Agree to join in free online financial education workshops
